UW Medicine

Department of Anesthesiology & Pain Medicine

The Anesthesiology Visiting Scholars Program (AVSP) is a funded program designed to provide a month-long educational experience for outstanding fourth year medical students interested in Anesthesiology. Students will spend four weeks at either the UW Medical Center or Harborview Medical Center participating in the care of patients in the general operating rooms. Medical students are introduced to the principles of anesthetic management, pharmacology of anesthetic agents, and physiologic response to anesthetic administration

A scholarship of \$2500 will be awarded to students accepted into our AVSP to help cover the costs of travel, housing, meals and application fees.

Eligibility

The program is open to all applicants interested in anesthesiology, especially those who do not have anesthesiology programs in their home institutions or who want to further their anesthesiology exposure. We encourage applicants who come from a broad range of those who are currently underrepresented in medicine to apply.

Department of Dermatology

The Dermatology Visiting Student Diversity Scholarship program seeks to provide funding for students interested in dermatology to experience the outstanding training programs at University of Washington. Although anyone is able to apply as a visiting student, the program is intended to support those with financial barriers that may prevent them from being able to participate otherwise. The 4-week elective rotation connects visiting students with current UW Dermatology faculty, students, and trainees for clinical and research exposure at several UW Medicine locations, and provides opportunities for mentorship and collaboration. Students may attend didactics, UW conferences, and site-specific educational rotations while also taking part in department-wide and residency-centered events. Scholars will be able to meet and socialize with UW medical students and residents, explore the UW community, and get a taste of life in Seattle.

Eligibility

Prerequisites include 4th year medical student standing, and completion of an 8 week internal medicine rotation.

Department of Emergency Medicine

The Emergency Medicine Scholars Program (EMSP) is a funded program designed to provide a broad, month-long educational experience for exceptional fourth year medical students from a broad range of those who have overcome significant barriers and/or traveled a great distance on their way to becoming a physician and/or have demonstrated a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity, equity, and inclusion. Students will spend four weeks in a sub-internship position gaining clinical experience at the Harborview Medical Center emergency department. Students will provide clinical care during emergency department shifts, participate in skills labs, and attend weekly resident teaching conferences. This clinical and didactic experience will be augmented with additional educational opportunities specific to the student's interest.

Students will have the opportunity to interview with the UW emergency medicine residency program.

Eligibility

The program is open to students at all LCME-accredited US medical schools who plan to pursue a career in emergency medicine, demonstrate a clear record of academic excellence, and who have overcome significant barriers and/or traveled a great distance on their way to becoming a physician and/or have demonstrated a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity, equity, and inclusion.

Department of Family Medicine

The University of Washington Family Medicine Residency offers year-round 4 week sub-internship rotations for visiting students that replicate student life in Seattle. Our residents train in a variety of practice settings, including tertiary academic medical centers, urban underserved practice, and rural community practice. Whether leading a medicine team at one of Seattle's major hospitals or caring for patients at a community practice site in Alaska or Montana, our residents are on the cutting edge of training in family medicine. Our Health Equity & Anti-Racism (HEAR) Scholarship is awarded to 4 visiting scholars who will be rotating with us. Awarded scholars will receive a \$1000 stipend to offset travel and housing costs, will participate in our learning curriculum, meet and socialize with UW trainees and faculty, explore Seattle and the Pacific Northwest, and receive mentorship from Health Equity & Anti-Racism faculty and resident leads

Eligibility

The program is open to all visiting 4th year medical students from LCME and AOA accredited MD/DO schools who plan to pursue a career in family medicine. Applicants are given priority for overcoming significant barriers on their journey into medicine, for participating in activities that serve diverse and/or marginalized communities, and for their commitment to advancing health equity and anti-racism in medicine.

Department of Laboratory Medicine & Pathology

The diversity visiting student program is a funded clerkship available to 1-2 medical students from a background that is underrepresented in medicine. The clerkship is a 4-week rotation in the Department of Laboratory Medicine & Pathology at the University of Washington Medical Center in Seattle, Washington. Students will work with our trainees and faculty on a variety of services including gynecological pathology, gastrointestinal pathology, dermatopathology, hematology, molecular genetics, and autopsy. We have the privilege of serving a diverse group of patients across a 5-state region (Washington, Wyoming, Alaska, Montana, Idaho).

Eligibility

- The program is open to applicants who are currently enrolled in a US medical school, demonstrate academic excellence and have overcome significant barriers or traveled a great distance on their way to achieve becoming a physician. This may include:
- economic disadvantage, defined as coming from a low-income family as specified by US DHHS
- socially disadvantaged, defined as coming from an environment that may significantly inhibit them from obtaining knowledge, skills, or abilities in pursuit of education in the health field
- Preference to 4th year medical students who plan to apply for residency in Anatomic & Clinical Pathology

The funded Visiting Clerkship positions will be available during the months of August, September, October and November. Funding includes a stipend of up to \$1500 to cover housing and travel costs for either 2 or 4 weeks.

Department of Medicine

The Visiting Scholars Program (VSP) is a funded program designed to give students from diverse backgrounds a chance to experience the training that the University of Washington Department of Medicine has to offer. Visiting students will spend four weeks on an internal medicine elective at the University of Washington Medical Center or Harborview Medical Center and care for a variety of patients in our tertiary care centers. During their time in Seattle, students will be able to meet with various residents and faculty to ensure that the UW is a place they would like to train. Students selected for the VSP will receive funding for their travel and lodging expenses. In addition, accepted applicants will receive an invitation to interview with the internal medicine residency program during the usual interview season.

Eligibility

The program is open to visiting medical students who demonstrate both academic excellence and an interest in advancing equity, diversity, and inclusion through their life experiences and/or efforts confronting inequities. Those who have overcome significant barriers and/or traveled a great distance to become a physician are encouraged to apply. Applicants should be strongly motivated to pursue a career in internal medicine or any of its subspecialties. The program is limited to students currently enrolled in a US medical school.

The Visiting Scholars Rotation is designed to give students from diverse backgrounds who are interested in a career in Neurology the opportunity to experience the excellent training that the University of Washington has to offer. Students will spend one month rotating on either the inpatient or consultation service as well as in outpatient subspecialty clinics at either the University of Washington Medical Center or Harborview Medical Center. Students interested in Pediatric Neurology will have the option to rotate at Seattle Children's Hospital. The experience will also include attending student and resident didactics, attending various subspecialty conferences, and being paired with a faculty mentor and resident ambassador who will help applicants get to know more about our program and about the city of Seattle. We do our best to tailor the experience based upon an applicant"s interests.

Scholarship recipients will be given special consideration for an interview with the University of Washington Neurology Residency Program or the Pediatric Neurology Residency Program as part of the Residency Match.

Eligibility

Funding is available to 3rd and 4th year medical students who demonstrate academic excellence, are interested in a career in Neurology, and who have overcome significant barriers or traveled a great distance on their way to achieve becoming a physician.

Attention will be given to those who have demonstrated a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity, equity, and inclusion, however, involvement in these activities is not strictly required. Students from all racial/ethnic backgrounds are encouraged to apply.

Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology

The Department of Obstetrics & Gynecology at the University of Washington created the Inclusive Visiting Learner Sub-Internship to support the Department's commitment to providing opportunities for trainees who bring diverse experiences, often underrepresented, in the field of medicine. This program selects two visiting medical students who identify as persons who have experienced significant adversity or disadvantage to participate in a 4th year OB/GYN sub-internship at the University of Washington. Students will spend 4 weeks on the High Risk Obstetrics or Gynecologic Oncology sub-internship rotations. Students will participate in daily clinical services & resident educational sessions. Students will also have the opportunity to meet with key members of the department including the Chair and Residency Program Director. Qualified applicants may be invited to interview for a residency position in Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Washington.

Eligibility

Competitive applicants will have experienced significant adversity or disadvantage in their paths to medicine. We are expansive in our consideration of disadvantages and adversity and students of all backgrounds are invited to apply. Circumstances that may meet these criteria include but are not limited to:

- A first-generation college student
- A recipient of social service resources in elementary or secondary school
- A person who experienced cultural, economic, educational, familial, or racial adversity

Clerkships are four weeks in duration and are available to full-time fourth year students who are in good standing at LCME-accredited U.S. medical schools.

Our Pediatric residency at the University of Washington (UW)/Seattle Children's Hospital (SCH) is committed to fostering an environment of inclusion. As the first Pediatric-specific visiting diversity student program created in 2005, we are excited to invite you to join us! Students will have the opportunity to experience the exceptional training that UW/SCH has to offer. You will spend four weeks on one of our inpatient medicine teams (General Medicine, Hematology-Oncology) as an acting intern or as a Nephrology elective student caring for patients in the clinic and on the wards. Other subspecialty electives may be considered based on availability. Students completing an acting internship will engage in three weeks of day shifts and one week of night shifts. Students will also be expected to attend morning report and noon conference daily, and attend all scheduled house staff teaching sessions and conferences.

Qualified applicants will be guaranteed an interview for our residency in Pediatrics at the UW

Eligibility

This program is open to applicants who are in their final year at a COCA or LCME-accredited medical school, are planning to apply to Pediatric residencies, and are committed to contributing to a physician workforce that prioritizes and celebrates diversity, equity, and inclusivity. This includes students with a demonstrated interest and participation in diversity programs, those who have overcome significant barriers in their pathway to medicine, those who are involved in activities and/ or organizations that serve diverse and/ or marginalized communities, and those who attend(ed) institutions that have historically served marginalized learners. Students of all backgrounds are invited to apply.

The Psychiatry Visiting Scholars Program is a funded program designed for 4th year medical students who have overcome significant barriers and/or traveled a great distance on their way to becoming a physician and/or demonstrated a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity, equity, and inclusion. Program participants have the opportunity to experience the exceptional education in psychiatry offered by the University of Washington. Students will spend four weeks on either an adult inpatient psychiatry team at Harborview Medical Center or a child and adolescent psychiatry inpatient team at Seattle Children's Hospital. They will also attend resident didactics and teaching conferences and will have the opportunity to go to clinic with a psychiatry faculty member or resident once or twice during the rotation. Funding for this program includes a \$3000 stipend for reimbursement of travel and housing costs.

Eligibility

The program is open to students at all LCME-accredited US medical schools (excluding the University of Washington) who plan to pursue a career in psychiatry, demonstrate a clear record of academic excellence, and who have overcome significant barriers and/or traveled a great distance on their way to becoming a physician and or demonstrated a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity, equity, and inclusion. Completion of all core clinical clerkships is required prior to the start of the program.

The Diversity Visiting Student Program is a funded initiative designed to give students from diverse backgrounds the opportunity to experience the outstanding training that is available in the Department of Radiology at the University of Washington and to experience life in Seattle, a thriving, dynamic, beautiful city with mild, dry, sunny summers. In the Diagnostic Radiology Clerkship, students will spend four weeks rotating through up to four services (such as Body Imaging, Chest Imaging, Emergency Radiology, Gastrointestinal and Genitourinary Fluoroscopy, Musculoskeletal Imaging, Neuroradiology, Nuclear Medicine, and Pediatric Radiology) at three of the five major teaching institutions that encompass the department's activities: UW Medical Center, Harborview Medical Center, and Seattle Children's Hospital.

Seattle Children's Elective Visiting Program

Seattle Children's Hospital is one of the original 15 pediatric surgery training programs in the United States. This visiting Elective Program is a unique opportunity for fourth year medical students who have overcome difficult paths to surgery (e.g., overcoming racism, sexism, xenophobia, poverty, among other forms of marginalization) and are interested in pursuing a career in General Surgery or Pediatric Surgery subspecialties. The elective will be awarded to two 4th year students who will spend 1 month with the Pediatric General Surgery service at Seattle Children's Hospital. Students will round on patient wards, spend time in the operating room and participate in educational conferences. In addition, students will be provided mentorship opportunities and longitudinal assistance with career development from our Pediatric faculty and residents.

Eligibility

Students should have demonstrated academic excellence, leadership and extracurricular experience, and demonstrate a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity and equity in the field of surgery (eg organizations, volunteer service, graduation from MSIs). Students should be highly motivated to pursue a career in General surgery and have an interest in Pediatric surgery. They must be in good standing at an LCME-accredited or COCA US medical school

The Diversity Visiting Student Sub-Internship Program is a funded program designed to give students with a diverse background a chance to experience the exceptional training that the University of Washington has to offer. Students will spend four weeks on two of the urology services teams at Seattle Children's Hospital, University of Washington Medical Center, Harborview Medical Center, and/or Puget Sound VA Hospital. Students will participate in all the duties and functions of a medical student sub-intern. They will also be expected to attend all scheduled house staff teaching sessions, conferences and present at the Department of Urology Grand Rounds at the end of their rotation.

At the completion of the clerkship, qualified applicants may be invited to interview for a residency position in Urology at the University of Washington.

Eligibility

The program is open to students at all LCME-accredited US medical schools (excluding the University of Washington) who demonstrate a clear record of academic excellence, and who have overcome significant barriers and/or traveled a great distance on their way to becoming a physician and/or have demonstrated a commitment to advancing and advocating for diversity, equity, and inclusion. Those who apply to the program should be students strongly motivated to pursue a career in Urology.
